We seek individuals who are passionate about transforming the DC school system and making a significant difference in the lives of public school students, parents, principals, teachers, and central office employees.

DCPS serves 48,600 students in the nation's capital through the efforts of approximately 4,000 educators in 112 schools. As part of a comprehensive reform effort to become the preeminent urban school system in America, DCPS intends to have the highest-performing, best paid, most satisfied, and most honored educator force in the nation and a distinctive central office staff whose work supports and drives instructional excellence and significant achievement gains for DCPS students.

Position Overview

Beginning this fall, the Office of Instructional Practice will implement LEAP, a research-based professional development model designed to foster collaboration between and for the development of teachers. The Teacher Leadership Innovation (TLI)-Extended Year, along with other school-based LEAP Content Leaders (generally Assistant Principals and Instructional Coaches) will be primary drivers of this professional development model in order to improve teacher practice and increase student achievement. At its core, LEAP is about creating content-specific, school-based learning teams that engage in a weekly cycle of lesson planning, content knowledge development, formative observations, and student work analysis. The LEAP cycle is grounded in DCPS curricular resources and facilitated by a content-specific leader. As leaders of LEAP teams, the Teacher Leadership Innovation (TLI)-Extended Year will spend at least 50% of their time in the classroom instructing students and the remainder of their time leading colleagues, and will receive an annual \$2,500 extra duty pay for fulfilling TLI Teacher Leader responsibilities. This position is a safety-sensitive position. As a result, throughout employment this position will be subject to the Employee Mandatory Drug and Alcohol Testing Policy.

The Teacher Leadership Innovation (TLI) Teacher Leader - Extended Year will report to the Principal.

Essential Duties and Responsibilities

The below statements are intended to describe the general nature and scope of work being performed by this position. This is not a complete listing of all responsibilities, duties, and/or skills required. Other duties may be assigned.

Teacher Leader Duties and Responsibilities:

- At the Elementary and Middle School level, TLI Teacher Leaders will be responsible for serving as a LEAP Content Leader in Literacy or Math, or as a TLI Teacher Leader in ECE, SPED, or Culture
- At the High School level, TLI Teacher Leaders, known as TLI Department Chairs, will be responsible for serving as a LEAP Content Leader for one of the following content areas: ELA, Math, Science, or Social Studies, or as a TLI Teacher Leader in SPED, or Culture
- Leads a content specific professional learning team through weekly cycles of lesson planning, content knowledge development, formative observations, and student work analysis tied to the DCPS curriculum (may not be relevant to SPED, Culture and ECE Roles)
- Facilitates teachers' understanding and implementation of the Common Core State Standards by developing and executing LEAP Cycles as well as informal (non-evaluative) observations and feedback (may not be relevant to SPED, Culture and ECE Roles)
- Develops teachers' practices by effectively employing coaching strategies that gradually release responsibility for implementing instructional practices to the teacher (for example, co-planning, modeling, and observing)
- Analyzes teacher practices through ongoing classroom observations, data analysis, and examination of student work
- Attends professional development meetings, summer and school year trainings, and all required events led by the DCPS Office of Instructional Practice

Teacher Duties and Responsibilities:

- Thoughtfully plans daily lessons and implements specific strategies to meet the needs of all students, providing extra support, enrichment, or variation of work when necessary
- Demonstrates a strong content knowledge and understanding of culturally responsive pedagogy
- Uses assessment data to refine curriculum and inform instructional practices
- Be accountable for students' academic growth and increase each individual student's achievement; creates a positive, achievement-oriented learning environment
- Reflects on successes and areas of growth as a teacher, seeks to improve performance, and responds to feedback
- Participates in collaborative curriculum development, grade-level activities, and school-wide functions

DCPS Notice of Nondiscrimination:

The District of Columbia Public Schools (DCPS) is committed to ensuring that all of its employees act in conformity with federal and District of Columbia nondiscrimination laws, including Titles VI and VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the Age Discrimination in Employment Act of 1967, the Age Discrimination Act of 1975, Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990, the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, the District of Columbia Human Rights Act of 1977, and the Genetic Information Nondiscrimination Act of 2008.

Accordingly, DCPS does not discriminate or tolerate discrimination against employees, applicants for employment, or students on the basis of actual or perceived race, color, religion, national origin, sex (including pregnancy), age, marital status, personal appearance, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression, family status, family responsibilities, matriculation, political affiliation, genetic information, disability, source of income, status as a victim of an interfamily offense, or place of residence or business.

DCPS also prohibits harassment based on any of the aforementioned protected traits and retaliation against a person because he or she has complained about discrimination, filed a charge of discrimination, or participated in a discrimination investigation or lawsuit.

Employees found to have engaged in prohibited discrimination, harassment, or retaliation will be subject to disciplinary action.

Notice of Non-Retaliation

District of Columbia Public Schools will not intimidate, threaten, coerce, discriminate against, retaliate or take adverse employment action against any employee, student, or volunteer that in good faith and with honest and non-malicious intent makes a report regarding potential violations of laws, regulations or policies.

Retaliation includes, but is not limited to, adverse job actions such as termination; denial of any bonus, benefit or training; reduction of salary or decrease in hours; or change in or transfer to a lesser position.

Individuals who violate this policy will be subject to the appropriate and applicable disciplinary process, up to and including termination.

The following Federal and District law concerning non-retaliation supports our Non-Retaliation Policy.

Title VII, Section 704(a), of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended, states the following:

(a) Discrimination for making charges, testifying, assisting, or participating in enforcement proceedings

It shall be an unlawful employment practice for an employer to discriminate against any of his employees or applicants for employment, for an employment agency, or join labor-management committee controlling apprenticeship or other training or retraining, including on-the-job training programs, to discriminate against any individual, or for a labor organization to discriminate against any member thereof or applicant for membership, because he has opposed any practice made an unlawful employment practice by this subchapter, or because he has made a charge, testified, assisted, or participated in any manner in an investigation, proceeding, or hearing under this subchapter.

DC Law 2-38 (Human Rights Act of 1977), Part G, Sec. 1-2525, states the following:

? 1-2525. Coercion or retaliation

(a) It shall be an unlawful discriminatory practice to coerce, threaten, retaliate against, or interfere with any person in the exercise or enjoyment of, or on account of having exercised or enjoyed, or on account of having aided or encouraged any other person in the exercise or enjoyment of any right granted or protected under this chapter.

(b) It shall be an unlawful discriminatory practice for any person to require, request, or suggest that a person retaliate against, interfere with, intimidate or discriminate against a person, because that person has opposed any practice made unlawful by this chapter, or because that person has made a charge, testified, assisted, or participated in any manner in an investigation, proceeding or hearing authorized under this chapter.

(c) It shall be an unlawful discriminatory practice for any person to cause or coerce, or attempt to cause or coerce, directly or indirectly, any person to prevent any person from complying with the provisions of this chapter.

DC Municipal Regulations, Title 5, (Board of Education) Subsection 1401.2(z) states the following:

(z) Retaliation for reporting harassment and sexual harassment. An employee commits an offense under this provision when he/she retaliates against any person who reports alleged harassment or sexual harassment, or any person who testifies, assists or participates in an investigation, or who testifies, assists or participates in a proceeding or hearing relating to such harassment or sexual harassment. An employee retaliates against a person if, as a result of action taken by the employee described in the previous sentence, 1)

such person is reasonably intimidated by verbal threats or physical conduct of the employee, or 2) such person is denied an opportunity, right or privilege to which he/she would otherwise be entitled, or 3) such person is subjected to detrimental treatment to which he/she would not otherwise be subjected.

Persons filing charges of discrimination are advised of these Non-Retaliation Policy and are instructed to notify the DCPS Equal Employment Opportunity Office, 1200 First Street, NE, 10th Floor, Washington, DC 20002, 202-442-5424, if any attempt at retaliation is made.
