RE: Letter of Response for Grievance #3270 filed on June 12, 2019



In accordance with 24 DCMR Subtitle 5-B, Section 2405 of the District of Columbia Municipal Regulations, DC Public Schools (DCPS) Comprehensive Alternative Resolution and Equity (CARE) team has completed its preliminary investigation of the above referenced grievance.

Based on a review of the information provided, the grievance raised the following issues under the jurisdiction of this office:

- **5-B DCMR Subtitle 2405.1 (d) & (e)** where it is alleged that there has been a violation of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 which prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, color, and national origin; and the DC Human Rights Act of 1977 which, in part, prohibits discrimination on the basis of race and color.
 - On used a racial epithet when speaking about his teacher.

The preliminary investigation included speaking with Principal, about the incident, having a conversation with Teacher, and reviewing so Individualized Education Plan (IEP). DCPS CARE made attempts to contact you for an interview but was unsuccessful. As a result of this review, we have found that the claim does not warrant further investigation. Based on the information gathered during the preliminary investigation, this incident does not rise to the level of race-based discrimination that would be considered a violation of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. The type of behavior exhibited by is consistent with the behavioral challenges that are described in his Individualized Education Plan (IEP). In selection is IEP it explains that he "demonstrates challenging behavior across the school day such as off-task behaviors, inappropriate social behaviors, and unsafe aggression behaviors related to his ASD (Autism Spectrum Disorder) diagnosis".
