

DCPS Budget Hearing

Good evening:

I'm a DCPS veteran teacher of 20 years, a DC resident for the last 34 years, a DCPS graduate, and a parent of 2 DCPS graduates and a current DCPS student.

I am testifying today as a concerned citizen on all those fronts because of the priorities of DCPS in the budget process. The data show that money and resources that are being grossly disproportionately allocated to the DCPS central office instead of the local school.

As students and teachers know every day, education—teaching and learning, the real work of the school system happens in the classroom between teachers and students every day. I learned 20 years ago that if an administrator or central office employee doesn't come to work there is no break in student learning. However, if a teacher doesn't come no learning happens. The priority of any budget should be the classroom, however, when compared to other school systems that is not the case---instead---the data shows that the central office is the priority.

The US Census Bureau conducts an Annual Survey of School System Finances.

The Census Bureau has a table that shows how many “per pupil dollars” each of the 100 largest school systems in the country allocate to specific areas. Over the summer, I downloaded the most recent data, 2019, and I want to highlight some of these areas:

**Teacher Salary:** DCPS is 3<sup>rd</sup> behind NYC (\$2,246 more per pupil) and Boston (\$1,777 more per pupil).

**Teacher Benefits:** DCPS is ranked 35<sup>th</sup> behind NYC which allocates \$5,313 more per pupil, and Montgomery County our much higher performing immediate neighbor which allocates \$1,344 more per pupil

**Local School Administration:** DCPS Ranked Number 1 with \$300 more per pupil than the second ranked system and \$435 more than Montgomery Country (ranked 7)

**General Administration (Central Office):** DCPS ranked 1 by a landslide....DCPS allocates almost 2 ½ times more than the next highest school system (Boston). We allocated \$1,452 per student for general administration compared to \$599 for Boston which allocates the second highest amount. Montgomery Country –that high performing neighbor only allocates \$120 per pupil. DCPS allocates over 12 times MORE per student!

Secondly, I am concerned about how Average Position Costs were calculated last year for the FY23 budget process. The DCPS budget process purports to allocate a set amount of money to the local school that is only for the local school and does NOT include the central office. For example, the DCPS Budget shows that my school got \$5,645,707 for FY23. When looking at those budgets nearly the entire budget is spent on personnel. DCPS uses “average salaries” for each position, a fair practice on the surface to prevent age discrimination. However, a closer look at the DCPS’s Position Cost document shows thousands of dollars in Central Office claw backs for every single FTE or local school employee.

1. There were \$5,381 of add-on costs for every teacher in addition to their salary and benefits.
2. CSO: Principal, Assistant Principal, other admin: \$3,066 add-ons
3. AFSCME: \$2,871
4. Teamsters: \$4,256
  
5. These claw-backs include central office costs like:
  - a. Drug and Alcohol testing (\$27 per teacher even though I haven’t been tested in 20 years)
  - b. Finger printing screening (\$57 per teacher—even though teachers don’t get fingerprinted every year)
  - c. Fitness for Duty/FMLA Verification
  - d. ADA Accommodations
  - e. Enrollment Reserves (\$189 per teacher)
  - f. Backfill ???? (\$192 per teacher)
  - g. New Teacher Pipeline (\$48 per teacher)
  - h. Etc.
  
6. Nearly half of all of these add-ons are Impact Bonuses are listed as “Impact Bonuses” which the central office takes back from local school FOR EVERY SINGLE local school employee even though some positions do not qualify for any bonus at all and only a very small fraction of staff that do qualify actually get the bonus. Additionally, according to DCPS’s own documentation, these bonuses are not equitably given out to each school but instead are unevenly distributed with both race and age bias. Further, DCPS has also admitted that the poverty level of the local school also negatively impacts the bonuses given. Why should each school be charged:
  - a. \$2,350 per teacher
  - b. \$2,440 per CSO/Admin position
  - c. \$2,871 per AFSCME employee
  - d. \$2350 per Teamster employee

Lastly, I am concerned about the Central Office clawing back even more money from the local school. Last year, we had several unfilled positions and mid-year resignations. This affects the learning for ALL students in the school. I experienced this first hand last year. Last November, the intermediate Deaf and Hard of Hearing Teacher (DHOH) resigned. Those DHOH 5<sup>th</sup> graders were “mainstreamed” or thrown into my general education classroom with no support or PD or

training except an interpreter. As some of you may or may not know the pedagogy for teacher Deaf students is completely different hence their need for specialized instruction in a small group self-contained setting. This position was never filled, and I wasn't aware of any effort by DCPS to fill this position after winter break. Two positions were eventually filled before the end of the year, but several positions remained unfilled ALL YEAR. My question is what happened to that money that DCPS supposedly allocated to my school for those positions that were never filled? That was hundreds of thousands of dollars that DCPS "clawed back" from my school, and I am concerned that there is a built-in incentive for DCPS to not fill positions so they can "claw" that money back.

In summary I request the following:

1. DCPS's central office allocation is greatly reduced and brought in line with other school systems particularly our higher performing neighboring public school systems.
2. DCPS use ONLY the ACTUAL average salary and benefits for personnel when allocating money in the local school budget and STOP the "add-ons" or central office "claw-backs."
3. Once money is allocated to the local school that money stay with the local school and not be returned to the central office.
  - a. In the case of allocations for positions that are not filled for any or all of the school year, that 50% of the unused money be equitably distributed to the local school staff that has to cover the additional responsibilities due to the vacancies. The remaining 50% of the unused money be put into a pot for the LSAT to decide how to use by majority vote the following school year for local school programming and supplies/resources.
