





Phased Delivery Update

Phase II Funding Timeline

- In Fall 2021, DCPS made a request for \$45M to fund Phase II of the MacArthur Blvd Project
- In March 2022, this request was approved by Mayor Bowser for FY 2024
- In Council's review of the budget package, amount of funding was upheld but timeline was pushed back to FY 2025

Phased Delivery Update

MACARTHUR BLVD PROJECT PHASE I DELIVERY A

- Ensure building & technology systems are present and well-functioning
- Refurbish and renovate targeted existing spaces as needed to accommodate inaugural class
 - Add a kitchen/cafeteria to accommodate eventual capacity
 - Delivery: Summer 2023

MACARTHUR BLVD PROJECT PHASE II

DELIVERY B

 Additional renovations of existing building to accommodate target capacity (an additional ~21,000 sq. ft of program space)
 Delivery: Summer 2025

DELIVERY C

- New Build Addition to include auditorium and additional program space (square footage TBD)
- Delivery: Summer 2026

Phase I Update: Summer Progress

Phase I Work Includes:


- Security systems (access control, intrusion detection, etc) to DCPS standards
- Operational Systems: Public address system, clocks, WiFi, etc
- Standard classroom improvements (paint, flooring, appropriate furniture, etc) throughout existing building
- Smartboard installation in classrooms targeted for SY '23-24 use
- Renovation of a portion of the building to accommodate kitchen/cafeteria

Thus Far, Work has focused on:

- Design progress for kitchen/cafeteria space
- Soliciting subcontracts
- Releasing purchase for long lead items
- Beginning the permitting process to begin construction in earnest

Expected Completion of Phase I Construction is Summer 2023



EXPLORING IB IN DCPS SCHOOLS

DCPS's Approach to Academic Rigor – IB Curriculum

DCPS currently offers IB learning pathways at Banneker and Eastern High Schools. Both schools are accredited under the International Baccalaureate[®] (IB) Diploma Program (DP).

How does DCPS approach IB Curriculum? The IB Diploma Program is intended for students in grades 11 and 12. Eastern now offers the Middle Years Program (MYP) for 9th and 10th graders.

Students pursue IB curriculum by completing courses aligned with DCPS high school curriculum, standards and expectations.

Students can attempt to gain the whole IB DP Diploma program or can choose to take specific IB courses and exams, only.

The DCPS School Budget model provides additional support for schools with IB programs. Each program has a school-based IB coordinator to support implementation and IB commitments.

The DCPS Global Education Team provides support to each program and acts as a liaison between the schools Coordinator and the IB Organization. The team also provides district wide supports for both school-based and Central Office staff.



IB Programming: Eastern Senior High School

Eastern is authorized in both the Middle Years Program (MYP) and the Diploma Program (DP).

Whole-School Model. Eastern provides IB programming for all students across all grade levels. Under the newly accredited MYP, all 9th and 10th graders complete DCPS courses with an IB-focus.

Learning Pathways. Students at Eastern have two DP pathways:

1. Pursue the full IB Diploma, completing: 6 IB subject courses, the Theory of Knowledge course, an extended Essay, and undergo Creativity, Activity, and Service experiences.

2. Take student-selected DP courses, working toward individual IB credit

Many students at Eastern take at least one DP course and opt to earn individual IB credit that complement CTE and other specific course loads.

IB-Focused Course Offerings. There aren't many AP courses offered at Eastern. Students are exposed to a wide range of subjects all taught through an IB lens. Both DP pathways allow students to gain transferrable college credits.

IB Programming: Benjamin Banneker Academic High School

As a specialized high school, Banneker offers both AP courses and courses in the IB curriculum.

Cohort Model. In the 10th grade, students elect to participate in DP and begin IB classes in 11th and 12th grade. This results in a small cohort of students who accomplish the requirements for an IB Diploma.

Graduate Success. Since 2018, an average of 17 students enrolled in at least one IB course at Banneker. 65%, or 11 of the 17, successfully completed the IB Diploma. All students were awarded the DCPS Diploma upon graduation.

Dedicated Courses. Students enrolled in DP follow the IB course curriculum. Students outside of DP, take AP courses. All students must meet the DCPS graduation requirements. Due to the nature of dedicated course offerings, students focus on their individual studies.

As we discuss IB programming at MacArthur, DCPS has two goals:


- 1. Develop the strongest possible academic program for MacArthur;

DCPS Budgets

For SY22-23, DCPS introduced a revised budget model. Under the updated model, schools will receive additional funds to support students with greater needs.

DCPS Budgets: How IB programming is funded

In addition to student- and staff-based dollars, the budget model includes supplemental program allocations that are specific to school needs. One type of program allocation is for International Baccalaureate (IB) schools.

The IB program allocation covers staffing requirements and nonpersonnel costs mandated by the International Baccalaureate Organization (IBO).

Options for IB @ MacArthur

Here are some recommended options DCPS can implement for MacArthur HS. Please provide feedback, thinking of your specific stakeholder group.

Whole School Model. From an equity lens, DCPS suggests MacArthur offers IB programming for all students. This will ensure all students have access to the same program standards and structures.

IB Programs. MacArthur could offer IB curriculum through either the MYP for grades 9 and 10, the DP for grades 11 and 12, or both programs for all grades. DCPS recommends both MYP and DP offerings.

AP until Accreditation. Until MacArthur gains accreditation, the school can offer AP courses to students. This will align MacArthur with non-IB high schools throughout the district. AP courses can be part of the regular curriculum sequence (like Banneker) or can be gradually phased out (like Eastern).

IB-Focused Courses. Even without accreditation, MacArthur can orient students in IB philosophies. Courses can be structured to support coursework for MYP in grades 9 and 10, while all students can undergo foundations of Creativity, Action and Service, a mandated requirement for the Diploma program.

Next Steps

- DCPS will continue to regularly update the community with project developments. We plan to return to the CWG series late fall/early winter. In the interim, we will continue planning efforts and begin in-person connections with MacArthur feeder schools.
- DCPS will submit recommended next steps in program, content and curriculum and school name to DCPS Leadership. Final recommendations will be approved by the Mayor and then shared broadly with the community.
- 3 DCPS will launch a MacArthur school website to be the direct source of MacArthur updates. DCPS will also launch a community listserv to communicate with the community via email.
