



# Attendance and Enrollment Every Day Counts!

## **EVERY** DAY **COUNTS** If you are having difficulty attending school regularly, please contact the attendance staff at your school.

### Attendance

#### **Attendance Counts Every Day, Starting Day 1!**

- ✓ Attendance is legally required
- ✓ Attendance impacts student grades
- ✓ Attendance helps account for student safety
- ✓ Attendance rates help guide school- and Districtplanning

## Attendance

### How can I support my child with on time, daily attendance?

#### **Before School**

- Set a regular routine for waking up and eating breakfast at home or at school.
- Try to leave the house at the same time every day.

#### **After School**

- Set a regular routine for completing homework.
- Ask questions about school and friends.
- Provide incentives for good attendance and talk about consequences for missing school.

#### The Night Before

- Set a regular bedtime schedule.
- Prepare student's school bag, lunch, and outfit for the next day.
- Set an alarm on phone or alarm clock.

#### Throughout the year

- Set consistent expectations about attendance, reinforce why attendance matters, and refuse to write a note for unacceptable reasons.
- Stay informed about school policies regarding start times and excused/unexcused absences.
- Provide a note for excused absences within five school days.
- Plan vacations and appointments when school is not in session.

#### FIRST DAY OF SCHOOL CHECKLIST

- Enroll! Complete your child's enrollment paperwork at enrolldcps.dc.gov or by stopping by your school.
- Get your required immunizations before school starts!

  Book your child's annual wellness appointment and ensure your child has all of their required childhood immunizations.

  Go to enrolldcps.dc.gov/node/71 to get started.
- Every Day Counts! All students are expected to attend school every day, starting with the first day of school. School keeps students safe, educated, and prepared for a bright future. Don't miss out! Please reach out to your school's attendance counselor if you need support.



## Medicaid Beneficiaries- Remember to Renew!



Medicaid beneficiaries are being asked to renew their coverage. There was no need to renew coverage during the public health emergency -but that has changed!

- The District restarted
   Medicaid eligibility renewals on a monthly basis
   beginning April 1, 2023
- Beneficiaries have 2 or 3 months to renew once contacted, then a 3 month grace period after it expires
- Department of Health Care Finance (DHCF) is required to contact Medicaid beneficiaries via mail to renew their coverage.

To check your coverage, update your address, or renew your coverage, you may:

- ✓ Visit a DHS Service Center or call 202-727-5355 for assistance
- ✓ Mail a completed renewal in, fax your renewal in, or drop your application off at a DHS Service Center

# Health Healthy students and healthy schools!

## Universal Health Certificate



## Immunization Requirements

All students are expected to be up to date on their required childhood immunization at the start of the school year.

Students in pre-K 3,
Kindergarten, 7th and 11<sup>th</sup>
grades will face temporary school
exclusion\_beginning Dec 4, if not
compliant for required childhood
immunization.

COVID Vaccine is not required



#### 2-3 years old

The following vaccines are typically received before the age of 2:

- 4 doses of Diphtheria/Tetanus/Pertussis (DTaP)
- 3 doses of Polio
- . 1 dose Varicella if no history of chickenpox
- 1 dose of Measles/Mumps/Rubella (MMR)
- . 3 doses of Hepatitis B
- 2 doses of Hepatitis A
- 3 or 4 doses\* of Hib (Haemophilus Influenza Type B)
- 4 doses of PCV (Pneumococcal)

\*5



#### 11-12 years old

Additional Required Vaccines AFTER receiving all vaccines under 2-3 years and 4-6 years.

- 1 dose of Tdap
- 1 dose of Meningococcal (Men ACWY)
- 2 doses of Human Papillomavirus Vaccine (HPV)\*
- \*3 doses of HPV vaccine required if series initiated after 15th birthday

Your child should receive these vaccine doses upon school enrollment\*



#### 4-6 years old

Additional doses needed after receiving the vaccines listed under 2-3 years of age:

- 1 dose of Diphtheria/Tetanus/Pertussis (DTaP)
- 1 dose of Polio
- 1 dose of Varicella if no history of chickenpox
- 1 dose of Measles/Mumps/Rubella MMR)



#### 13-15 years

Additional Required Vaccines AFTER receiving all vaccines under 2-3 years, 4-6 years, and 11-12 years.



#### 7-10 years old

Consult your PROVIDER to be certain your student has received <u>all vaccinations listed</u> under 2-3 and 4-6 years of age.



Additional Required Vaccines AFTER receiving all vaccines under 2-3 years, 4-6 years, and 11-12 years.

1 dose of Meningococcal (Men ACWY)

Consult your PROVIDER to be certain your student has received all vaccinations listed under 2-3 years, 4-6 years, and 11-12 years.

# Updated School Health Services Program (SHSP) Staffing Model

- DC Health is making changes to the health suite staffing model, shifting to team-based care
- Schools will be grouped into clusters of four
- Each cluster will include four schools, both DC Public Schools and Public Charter Schools, that are close to one another
- Each cluster will have two nurses (a Registered Nurse or Licensed Practical Nurse) and at least two student health technicians
- Nurse Managers will supervise staff in each cluster
- Every school will be assigned one consistent, full-time health suite staff person with the goal of 40 hours per week

## Responsibilities of Student Health Technicians

- First Aid
- Access to telehealth consultation with RN on the team at any time
- Asthma Care Management
- Mental Health Screenings
- Administration of medication according to student medication forms and emergency medication

- Care Coordination
  - Referrals to medical and behavioral health specialists
- Review of immunization records
- Vision and Hearing Screenings
- Collection, review and entry of school health forms
- Communication with parents (letters, phone calls)
- Diabetes care under supervision of cluster RN



## Responsibilities of School Nurses

- Administration of injectable medicines other than insulin
- Assessment of children with acute illnesses
- Medical procedures
- Health and nutrition education
- Communicable and infectious disease reporting and tracking

- Health suite oversight
- Individualized Health Plan (IHP) participation
- Primary point of contact for school health teams
- Telehealth consultation with medical specialists regarding children's illnesses
- Immunization Compliance



## Protecting Students: Narcan in DCPS

- Naloxone or Narcan is an opioid reversal agent that can save the life of an individual experiencing an opioid overdose by restoring normal breathing
- Several students experienced opioid overdoses on school campuses in school years 21-22 and 22-23
- To protect students from the potentially lethal effects of an opioid overdose,
   The Department of Behavioral Health (DBH), The Department of Health (DC Health) and District of Columbia Public Schools collaborated to make Naloxone or Narcan available in all DCPS schools
- School health suite staff, administration of medication (AOM) staff and some school staff complete training approved by the Department of Behavioral Health (DBH) and be trained to respond to student opioid overdose emergencies

## DCPS Emergency Planning & Guidance


Keeping students and staff safe at school every day is a top priority.

Emergency drills allow schools to practice and prepare to ensure systems are in place in the event of a real emergency.

Drill Type	Frequency
Fire Drill	<ul> <li>One fire drill each month of the school year.</li> <li>A total of 12 drills per school year</li> </ul>
Lockdown Drills	Twice per school year
Alert Drill	Once per school year
Earthquake Drill	Once per school year
500 ft. Evacuation/Relocation Drill	Once per school year
Reverse Evacuation Drill	Once per school year
Shelter-in-Place Drill	Once per school year
Severe Weather Safe Area Drill	Once per school year

## Safe Passage and School Safety

- The Safe Passage Safe Blocks (SPSB)
   program will maintain coverage in the existing 8 priority areas, supporting 35 schools.
- Safe Spots will expand to all 8 priority areas giving students a safe space to be if they feel threatened as they travel to and from school.
- The DC SchoolConnect Micro transit Shuttles for Wards 7 & 8 will continue to serve a total of 32 schools.



## Transportation

Kids Ride Free (KRF)

- KRF remains in place for SY23-24; schools will share with families when students can receive their cards

- New Expectations for School Visitors establishes expectations for all parents, guardians, volunteers, and other visitors to DCPS schools.
- These expectations apply to all individuals while on school property and at DCPS events.



- ✓ Outlines goals around our collective goal of supporting teaching and learning and student and community safety
- ✓ Creates shared norms related to problemsolving
- ✓ Lists prohibited behaviors and consequences, and steps school leaders may take after a serious incident that compromises the safety and security of students and staff or disrupts school instruction, operation, or activities
