2	"Bullying is Not OK" The goal of this lesson is to support students to fully grasp the fact that bullying is never a good or okay thing to take part in and to prepare students for what to do if they encounter bullying.	N/A
	"Seeking Help" The goal of this lesson is to get students to understand the concept that teasing, touching, bullying, or being forced to touch someone else is never ok and is an important sign that help needs to be called upon right away.	
3	"Teasing and Bullying" This lesson defines teasing, harassing, and bullying through a discussion between the teacher and students, why these behaviors are extremely wrong by providing concrete examples.	N/A
4	"Your Body Your Rights" This lesson addresses sexual harassment and sexual abuse. "Taking a Stand Against Bullying" Students learn effective ways to handle when they or someone they know is being teased, harassed, or bullied, and discuss different skills to take action. 9	"It Isn't My Fault." The goals of this lesson are for students to be able to describe at least two impacts of rape and sexual assault on someone who has been assaulted, to explain why a person who has been raped or sexually assaulted is never at fault, and to reflect on their own feelings about rape and sexual abuse	"Trust it or Trash it" "Orientation Behavior and Identity" "Understanding Gender" "Decisions Decisions" "Planning and Protection" "What If?" "Condom Confidence" "Know Your Options" "We all Have Rights" "Using Technology Respectfully and Responsibly" Cornerstone 2: "Stop the Spread" Students will continue their study of disease and explore why people are affected differently by disease. They will research various communicable diseases and analyze factors that contribute to the spread of the disease. Students will then develop a strategy to limit the spread of a disease. Cornerstone 4: "Family Matters" Students will explore the financial, mental and emotional ramifications of having a child. Students will be assigned a budget and a parenting scenario. Students must then research a month in the life of the parent in the scenario				
10	"Rights, Respect, Responsibility: Don't Have Sex Without Them" This lesson defines sexual consent and explain its implications for sexual decision making. It also explains why using tricks, threats or coercion in relationships is wrong, and analyzes factors, including alcohol and other substances, that can affect the ability to give or perceive the provision of consent to sexual activity.					
11	"My Boundaries" The goal of this lesson is for students to define what a boundary is and to explain at least two examples of types of boundaries, to clarify what their own boundaries are in relation to physical touch, and to demonstrate an understanding for the need to communicate about boundaries in a romantic or sexual relationship. "Is it Abuse If" The goal of this lesson is for students to describe at least two characteristics of five different types of relationship abuse. Students will explain what, in their own opinion, does and does not constitute relationship abuse and name one online and one hotline resource teens can use to get help if they or someone they know is in an abusive relationship.					
12	"Sexual Rights Who Decides" The goal of this lesson if for students to identify their own feelings about a specific type of law relating to statutory rape and describe at least two messages about sexual consent, abuse, age and gender, and the source(s) of those messages.
